Re: 2021 Legislative Session – Update on Climate Change Legislation and Budget Items

This legislative session, Oregon Department of Energy staff is tracking legislation and budget items that are relevant to the Oregon Global Warming Commission and the recommendations made in the Commission's 2020 Biennial Report to the Legislature. ODOE staff will share updated reports at each OGWC meeting during the legislative session, with a final staff report at the first meeting after the legislative session ends in June. We will also include updates on relevant budget issues as the Ways and Means process unfolds. This memo includes updates about legislation and the budget process since the [January 26](#), and [March 1](#) memos, which were posted in advance of the January 29, 2021 and March 5, 2021 Oregon Global Warming Commission meetings.

LEGISLATION:

ODOE staff has updated the list of climate-related bills from earlier memos, adding notes about each bill's current status. April 13 was an important threshold in the legislative process, being the date by which bills assigned to a policy committee must have been passed by that committee and sent to their next destination: House or Senate Floor, a House or Senate Committee on Rules, or a budget or finance committee if the bill would have fiscal implications. Budget and finance committees are not subject to the deadline, including Joint Ways and Means, Senate Finance and Revenue, and House Revenue. Note that several bills of interest to the Commission relating to electric vehicles or alternative fuels have been assigned to the Joint Committee on Transportation, which as a joint committee is also not subject to the deadline. Bills that failed to clear this initial procedural hurdle as of April 13 are shaded grey in the table below.

Bills with an “A” after the bill number have been amended by a committee, with A-Engrossed versions that incorporate the amendments now under consideration; in some cases, committees have adopted amendments to a bill but the newly-amended version has not yet been published.

As with previous versions of this memo, the table of bills that follows is organized into the same categories used to group recommendations in the Commission’s 2020 Biennial report.

BUDGET:

As noted in the January 26 memo, climate change, environmental justice, and wildfire response and prevention are top priorities in Governor Kate Brown’s Recommended Budget. Specifically, the Governor’s budget includes investments to assist Natural Resources agencies to meet the objectives of Executive Order 20-04, including GHG mitigation work at the Department of Environmental Quality and climate mitigation and adaptation work at both the Department of Forestry and the Department of Land Conservation and Development. The Governor’s budget aligns with OGWC recommendations on environmental justice, including creating an Office of Environmental Justice at DEQ and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion positions at several Natural Resources agencies.

The Joint Ways and Means Subcommittee on Natural Resources continues to hold public hearings on agency budgets, and has heard testimony on the following agency budget bills so far:
