

CERTA Approach

- Federal dollars are complementary to existing state programs and will reduce GHGs and provide significant cobenefits within five years.
- Designed to prioritize low income and disadvantaged communities and boost economic development in rural areas.
- Supports front line communities that are most impacted by climate change and often have the fewest resources.
- Development process included engagement with partner agencies, local jurisdictions, and tribes with a shared goal to create sustainable and transformative approaches to tackling the climate crisis.
- Includes funds to support programs across five states agencies and many local jurisdictions throughout the state.







Waste and Materials

Building reuse and space-efficient housing: Reuse of existing buildings for housing and smaller new housing – 940 affordable workforce housing incentives

Food waste infrastructure: New and expanded food waste recovery infrastructure- up to 26 projects completed

Landfill methane controls: Projects going above and beyond existing requirements- up to 6 landfills with added capture

Incentives for building more energy efficient housing: New housing units at least 10% more energy efficient than code- 4500 multi family and 4920 single family unit incentives

Commercial building performance standards incentives: Supports early and voluntary compliance- 321 commercial building incentives

Heat pump incentives: Expands existing heat pump programs- 12,000 heat pump incentives

Residential weatherization: Expands existing residential weatherization programs- 2690 incentives



Transportation

Light duty electric vehicle rebates: Charge Ahead: Increases access to ZEVs for lower income households-4403 rebates

Light duty electric vehicle charging: Community Charging Rebates: Charging stations in low income and disadvantaged communities- 688 rebates

Medium and Heavy-Duty electric vehicle rebates: ZEV purchases in environmental justice communities 0164 rebates

Medium and Heavy-Duty electric vehicle grants: Deployment of ZEVs to replace older diesel trucks- 37 new ZEVs

Medium and Heavy-Duty vehicle charging infrastructure grants: Projects critical to increasing Oregon's EV charging network- 11 new MHD ZEV charging stations

• Court of Appeals invalidated CPP rules in December 2023


Provide certainty and clarity on Oregon's climate policy





CPP 2024 rulemaking scope

- Reestablish a program to set limits on emissions from significant sources in Oregon
 - Enforceable & declining limits on fossil fuels beginning in 2025.
 - Comparable scope and emissions reduction ambitions as CPP 2021
- Staff don't intend to propose a major program redesign, but
 - Open to hearing new ideas for program design and implementation
 - Adjustments needed for 2025 program start

CPP 2024 rulemaking scope


DEQ will consider modifications that would further strengthen the program.
