Cathy Macdonald and Oregon Global Warming Commission members;

I have a few comments and suggested additions/ revisions to the Principles, Scope of Work and Work Plan in Cathy's July 10th Memorandum on Implementation of EO 20-04 with a focus on the development of a proposal of state goals for carbon storage and sequestration by Oregon's natural and working lands.

- 1) In the Principles section (page 1) under the bullet about proposed practice, program and policy recommendations, I recommend adding that proposed practices will also be based on best available science (rather than restricting use of best available science to inventory, baseline and projection methods).
- 2) Also in the Principles section, I recommend broadening this principle: Include provisions to ensure a diversity of landowners can participate...
To: .. to ensure a diversity of landowners *and land managers* can participate.
It's important, especially in the agriculture sector that land managers can also benefit from incentives for practices they are implementing, whether or not they own the land.
- 3) Regarding that same section about ensuring a diversity of landowners can participate, we support investments in a diverse set of management practices that each farm and ranch with its own unique geography, conditions, and management needs can find solutions that will fit for their farm.
- 4) The activities in the work plan look solid to us. We appreciate the opportunities for informing and engaging stakeholders and we look forward to being engaged!
- 5) For the timeline, consider reaching out to Tribes earlier in the timeline. They may have some valuable inventory input.
